CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

During the year the State Government did not change the cap of 27,500 announced in December 1995, and retained in December 1997. Consequently there was no significant change in the number of electronic gaming machines allowed to operate outside the casino, with the number of licensed electronic gaming machines increasing marginally from 26,965 to 27,289.

The Authority rejected two requests from Crown Limited to increase the number of electronic gaming machines and reduce the maximum number of gaming tables permitted to be in operation at the Melbourne Casino. The Authority approved Crown Limited becoming a wholly owned subsidiary of Publishing and Broadcasting Limited on 30 June 1999.

Although there was no growth of note in the overall numbers of electronic gaming machines, gaming issues continued to be of interest to the community. The Productivity Commission commenced its Inquiry into Australia's Gambling Industries. To date the Productivity Commission has called for submissions from interested parties in the preparation of a draft report. The Authority made three submissions to the Productivity Commission's inquiry. A further submission is expected to be made in response to the draft report issued by the Productivity Commission.

During the year work commenced on the second triennial review of the casino operator and licence. This report is due to be handed to Government by 30 June 2000.

On 1 July 1998, I announced the Authority's third research program. This research program comprises an integrated package of eleven distinct projects; one on-going survey series, eight new projects and the introduction of two longitudinal surveys. Work commenced on this program during the year and it is expected to be completed during the next financial year.

During the year there was no change to the composition of the Board of the Authority. On 28 June 1999 the Director of Gaming and Betting also became the Director of Casino Surveillance.

I would like to thank all members of the Authority, the Director of Gaming and Betting and his staff for their professional approach, hard work and commitment to assisting the Authority in discharging its statutory responsibilities.

O V E R V I E W

The Victorian Casino and Gaming Authority is a statutory body established under the *Gaming and Betting Act 1994*. The Authority commenced operations in June 1994.

The legislation provides that the Authority shall consist of up to ten members and specifies that these members shall be appointed by the Governor in Council and shall include one representative of the Victoria Police. Authority Members are listed at page 3.

Members of the Authority come from a wide range of backgrounds including the church, academia, business and industry and bring a diverse range of social, financial, legal, accounting and commercial skills to the Authority.

To facilitate consideration of the Authority's financial and research responsibilities, two committees have been established which meet and report to the Authority as required - the Audit Committee and the Research Committee.

The Audit Committee is comprised of up to three Authority members and the Director of Gaming and Betting. As at 30 June 1999, Authority members serving on the Audit Committee were Mr Henry Bosch AO, Chairman, Dr Desmond Hore and Mr Donald Swan. The Chairman of the Authority and the Auditor-General have a standing invitation to attend each meeting of the Audit Committee.

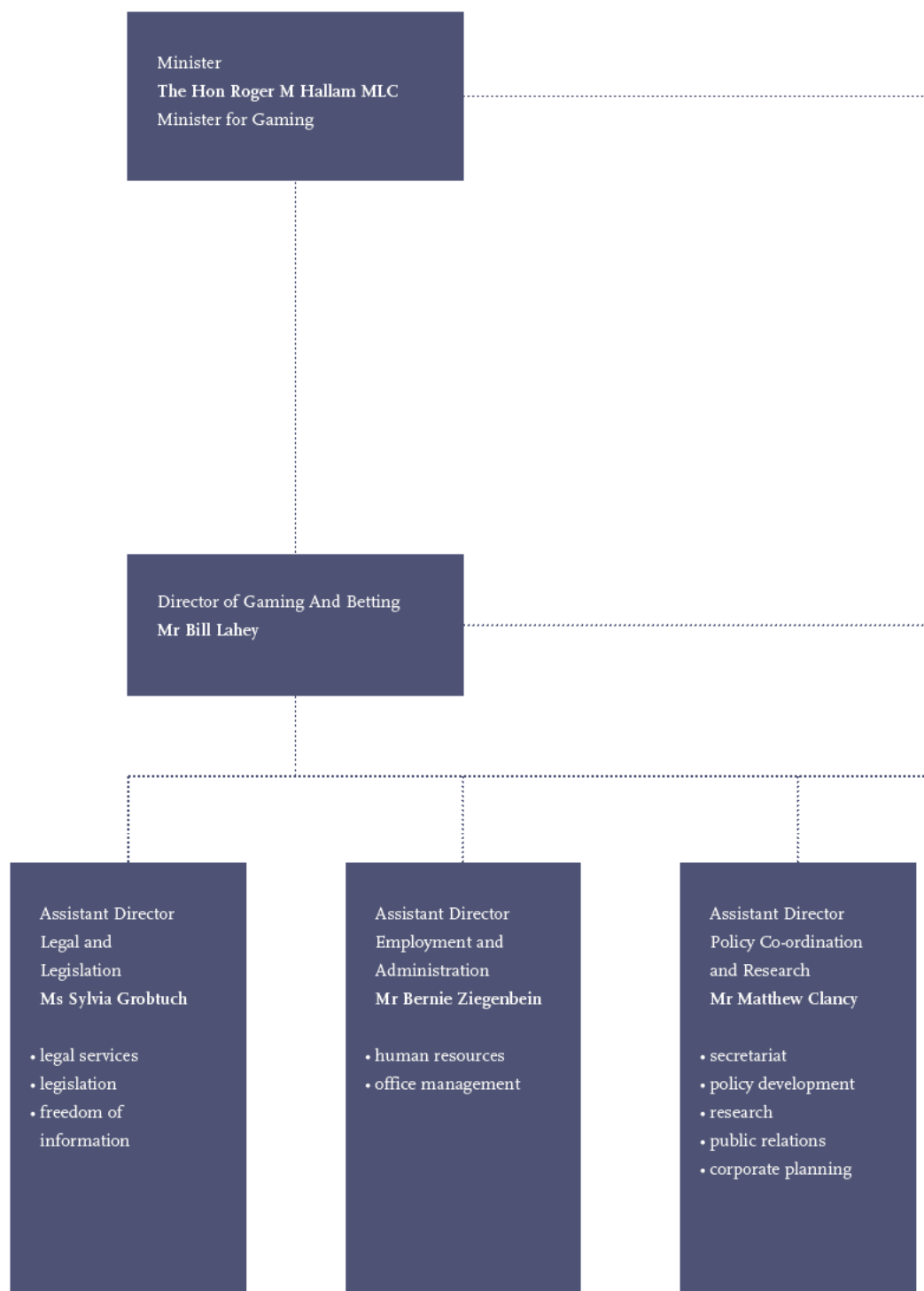
The Research Committee, chaired by Professor Anne Edwards, is comprised of four members of the Authority, including the Chairman of the Authority, Mrs Sue Winneke, plus the Director of Gaming and Betting. Other members of the Authority serving on the Research Committee as at 30 June 1999 were the Reverend Professor Robert Gribben and Professor Trang Thomas AM.

The Director of Gaming and Betting is appointed by the Governor in Council and has specific statutory duties under the legislation. As Chief Executive Officer, the Director is responsible for the day to day operations of staff. He is accountable to the Secretary, Department of Treasury and Finance for staffing and general administration matters. The current Director of Gaming and Betting is Mr Bill Lahey.

The Director of Casino Surveillance is appointed by the Governor in Council and has statutory responsibility for the supervision of the Melbourne Casino, the approval of gaming equipment and changes in the gaming and security layouts of the casino. He also makes recommendations to the Authority regarding the rules of the games and the system of controls and procedures in the casino, investigates complaints from casino patrons, ensures that taxes, charges and levies are paid by the casino operator and ensures that the handling and counting of money in the casino is supervised. Mr Ian Manning was the Director of Casino Surveillance until 27 June 1999. On 28 June 1999 a new organisational structure was put in place which resulted in Mr Bill Lahey becoming the Director of Casino Surveillance.

Licences, Permits and Authorisations

Special Employee Licences

A number of changes were made to the licensing of special employees and technicians:

- an application for a Special Employee's licence no longer needs to be accompanied by a certificate signed by the venue operator or gaming operator who employs or is proposing to employ the applicant;
- the two previous classes of Special Employee Licence - Venue Manager/Supervisor and Gaming Machine Attendant - were replaced with one class of Special Employee licence which allows the licensee to undertake all of the prescribed duties; and
- the Special Employee Application Form was revised to accommodate the changes referred to above and to incorporate new procedural improvements.

These changes simplified the application process while maintaining the existing standards of probity.

There was an increase in monthly applications from an average of 517 per month in 1997-98 to 655 per month in 1998-99.

Bingo Employee Licences

An application for a Bingo Employee's licence no longer needs to be accompanied by a certificate of competence from a Bingo Centre Operator who employs or is proposing to employ the applicant (whether as a volunteer or for payment).

This change, which became effective on 24 November 1998, was introduced to bring the licence into line with the licensing of Special Employees and Technicians.

Shareholder Monitoring

Under the *Gaming and Betting Act 1994*, a person has a prohibited shareholding interest in TABCORP Holdings Ltd if that person is entitled to voting shares of more than 5% of the total on issue. If a prohibited shareholding is detected, the Minister for Gaming may require that person to dispose of the relevant number of shares. No shareholder was required by this process to divest any shares to comply with the requirements of the legislation.

In addition, approval from the Authority is necessary for any person, other than a defined founding shareholder, that is, Hudson Conway Limited, The Federal Hotels Group Limited and Carlton and United Breweries Limited, to be entitled to more than 5% of the total number of shares on issue in Crown Limited. As reported elsewhere in this Report, the Authority granted Publishing and Broadcasting Limited (PBL) approval to hold more than 5% of the shares in Crown Limited.

Merger of Crown Limited with PBL

On 14 December 1998, Crown Limited announced that it proposed to merge with PBL, subject to receipt of all necessary approvals. A submission was received from Crown Limited on 24 December 1998, seeking the Authority's approval of the proposed merger.

On 26 May 1999, the Authority advised Crown Limited that it had approved the merger. The merger was settled on 30 June 1999.

Changes to Casino Arrangements

Eighth Variation Agreement to the Casino Agreement

The Authority agreed to a number of variations to the Casino Agreement to reflect the change in the ownership of Crown Limited, which became a wholly owned subsidiary of PBL on 30 June 1999. The variations were subsequently approved by the Minister for Gaming.

Supplemental Casino Agreement

With the approval of the Minister for Gaming, pursuant to section 142 of the *Casino Control Act 1991*, the Authority entered into a Supplemental Casino Agreement with Crown Limited and PBL.

Deed of Undertaking and Guarantee

The Authority became a party to a Deed of Undertaking and Guarantee between PBL, a number of PBL subsidiaries, Crown Limited and the Minister for Gaming.

Crown Limited Requests for Additional Electronic Gaming Machines

The Authority rejected requests from Crown Limited to increase the number of electronic gaming machines and reduce the maximum allowable number of gaming tables permitted to be in operation at the Melbourne Casino.

Compliance

Casino Surveillance

Casino Inspectors maintain a 24 hour supervisory presence in the Melbourne Casino. The Casino operated up to 335 gaming tables, compared with its permitted maximum of 350 tables, and 2,500 electronic gaming machines, the maximum permissible number. The casino operator has 18 different types of table games approved for play and currently offers ten for use in the Casino. There are 230 different games approved for play on electronic gaming machines.

Casino Layout

One hundred and twenty four applications were approved by the Director of Casino Surveillance for the reconfiguration of gaming tables and electronic gaming machines at the Melbourne Casino.

Internal Control Manual

Thirty seven submissions from Crown Limited were approved by the Authority under section 121 of the *Casino Control Act 1991* to amend the Internal Control Manual.

Casino Boundaries

Three changes to the boundaries of the licensed casino premises were approved by the Authority under section 17 of the *Casino Control Act 1991*.

Prosecutions and Warnings - Casino

Eighteen excluded persons were prosecuted for 114 offences of breaching their exclusion orders. Official warnings were issued to 38 persons who breached exclusion orders for the

first time and 40 persons are awaiting prosecution. One excluded person was prosecuted for obstructing a Casino Inspector in the exercise of his functions. Sixteen minors were issued with official warnings for entering the Casino and 14 minors were excluded from the Casino for periods of six months from their eighteenth birthdays. One minor was prosecuted for providing false identification.

On 21 occasions, persons who had been excluded from the Casino lodged appeals pursuant to section 73 of the *Casino Control Act 1991*. One appeal was upheld by the Authority. Six persons lodged invalid appeals and three other appeals did not proceed to a hearing. Seven appeals were withdrawn by the appellants and the casino operator revoked four exclusion orders as a result of pre-appeal hearing mediation sessions.

It should be noted that offences under the *Crimes Act 1958* and *Summary Offences Act 1966*, such as deception, including cheating, theft and begging within the Casino premises, are processed and prosecuted by the Victoria Police Casino Crime Unit with the assistance of Casino Inspectors when required.

Patron Complaints at the Casino

A total of 110 complaints were received from patrons relating to the conduct of gaming in the casino. Investigations found that in 98 instances gaming was conducted in accordance with the rules and procedures of the games approved by the Authority. Twelve complaints were resolved in favour of the patrons.

INTENDED OUTCOME 2

Investigations and Prosecutions - Gaming Venues and Minor Gaming

Investigative staff examined the operation of all licensed gaming venues in Victoria. In addition, unannounced inspections were made to minor gaming activities, including the drawing of trade promotion lotteries, to ensure compliance with the requirements of the Authority.

Forty one matters were successfully prosecuted in the Magistrates' Court. Offences and results are shown in the table below. Four venue operators and four nominees of a venue operator were found guilty of employing or using the services of an unlicensed person to perform the duties of a special employee.

Twenty people were prosecuted in accordance with section 145 of the *Gaming Machine Control Act 1991* regarding false or misleading information in relation to an application for a licence.

Note Criminal offences including instances involving fraud are processed and prosecuted by the Victoria Police with the assistance of Gaming Inspectors and Investigators where required.

Gaming Venue Audits

Ongoing audit and verification of financial data provided by the on line real time electronic gaming machine monitoring and control systems occurred. On site inspections of approved installed gaming equipment were carried out at 569 venues, which included operational compliance reviews.

Recognised Manufacturers and Suppliers of Gaming Equipment Audits

A number of on-site audits were conducted on Australian and overseas based companies listed on the Roll of Recognised Manufacturers and Suppliers of Gaming Machines and Restricted Components.

Gambling Systems Risk Management and Audit Program

Risk assessment was undertaken of the computer system associated with the central monitoring and control system provided by TABCORP. Eleven full audits and seven follow up reviews were undertaken of the computer systems associated with the gambling products provided by Tattersall's, TABCORP and Crown Limited. Where areas for improvement were identified, corrective measures were agreed with, and implemented by, the relevant operator.

Jackpot Audit Program

Reviews of electronic gaming machine jackpot systems were conducted to ensure contributions, prizes, pool balances and player entitlements were in accordance with Authority approvals and technical specifications.

Lotteries Supervision

Government supervisors attended all lottery draws, comprising Tatts Two, Super 66, Saturday Tattslotto, Oz Lotto, Powerball and Tatts Keno.

Patron Complaints at Gaming Venues

Twenty seven complaints from patrons were received and investigated in respect of electronic gaming machines and Club Keno at gaming venues.

Approval was granted for two new electronic gaming machine types, 37 new games for the TABCORP and Tattersall's gaming networks, and 15 new electronic gaming machine games for the Melbourne Casino.

Approvals were granted for 228 changes and modifications to existing machine types, games and systems in the TABCORP and Tattersall's gaming networks.

Approvals were granted for 54 modifications to TABCORP's Wagering and Sportsbook systems.

Approval was granted for six Club Keno bonus prize promotions.

Rules Approved by the Authority

Betting Rules

In accordance with section 72 of the *Gaming and Betting Act 1994*, the Authority considered rules for a TABCORP product "Trackside" (an approved betting competition) and consented to the making of the rules.

The Authority received one complaint regarding the "Rules relating to Betting Transactions in Victoria". The Authority determined that, having regard to the matters raised, the rules are reasonable and are not unfair to investors or contrary to public interest.

Other Rules - Casino Games

Under section 60 of the *Casino Control Act 1991*, the Authority approved five amendments to the rules of the games that may be played in the Casino. No new games were submitted for approval during the period.

National Standards for Electronic Gaming Machines

Victoria continued to take a leading role in the development of national standards for electronic gaming machines by chairing the Australia/New Zealand Working Party assigned the task of maintaining national technical requirements documents.

Players' Charter

Consultation occurred with interstate gaming regulators, gaming machine manufacturers, testing laboratories, the gaming machine operators and the casino operator on each of the Auditor-General's recommendations in respect of player fairness issues contained in the report "*Special Report No. 54, Victoria's Gaming Industry - An insight into the role of the regulator.*" An assessment commenced regarding information which may assist players to make an informed choice in respect of their gaming machine play.

Under agreements with other States and Territories for their share of lottery product sales, the amounts payable to these jurisdictions were verified prior to payment.

The 1998-99 Research Program, which was developed in accordance with the Authority's Research Charter (refer to Appendix 5), was announced on 1 July 1998.

In total the 1998-99 Research Program comprises an integrated package of eleven distinct projects; one on-going survey series, eight new projects and the introduction of two longitudinal surveys. The projects which comprise this program are as follows:

- the sixth and seventh surveys of community gambling patterns and perceptions;
- an examination of the impact of gaming on the club and hotel industries which will consider the provision of dining and other recreational, cultural and social facilities, the changes in the culture and the effect on the entertainment and music industries;
- an examination of the combined overall economic impact of gaming from the macro (State) level through to the base micro (individual household/person) level;
- the development of a survey instrument to accurately measure the prevalence of problem gambling in the Victorian context;

- a review, including geo-demographic profiling, of existing research data sets of the Authority;
- a study of the comparative history of gaming impacts in Australasia, followed by the development of a rigorous framework to measure the social impacts of gaming and the subsequent use of this framework in critically analysing and summarising the whole of the 1998-99 program;
- an examination of the impact of gaming on specific cultural groups;
- an evaluation of the availability of suitable crime statistics to enable meaningful analysis of the association between gambling and crime rates;
- a study of the impact and role of the expansion of gaming in the tourism, entertainment and leisure industries;
- a longitudinal examination of people's perceptions of electronic gaming machines and the casino and the relationship of these perceptions to actual gaming industry behaviours and events; and
- a longitudinal study of the impact of gaming on specific communities including both metropolitan and rural areas.

Report Released

The report *Sixth Survey of Community Gambling Patterns and Perceptions* was released in April 1999.

This survey is the sixth in a series which aims to observe and document changes in Victorian gambling patterns and to identify perceptions of, and attitudes towards, gambling amongst the Victorian adult community.

Internet Site

An Internet site was developed. The site includes information about the organisation, in addition to the names, location and licensed capacity of gaming venues in Victoria. Executive summaries of early research reports and the complete report for the *Sixth Survey of Community Gambling Patterns and Perceptions* are also available on the site.

A review of the Regulations was commenced with a view to completion in the first half of 1999-2000. The aims of the review are to assess the effectiveness and appropriateness of the Regulations made under the *Gaming No. 2 Act 1997* having regard to both the purpose of the Act and the powers contained in that Act, and where considered necessary or desirable, recommend for the Minister's consideration amendments to those Regulations.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 1999

1. Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of Accounting

This financial report has been prepared to comply with Australian Accounting Standards and with the requirements of the *Financial Management Act 1994*. It has been prepared using the full accrual basis of accounting based on historical cost accounting. The accounting policies adopted for the reporting period are consistent with those of the previous period, with the exception of the treatment of proceeds from the sale of assets and the capitalisation procedures for EDP Software (as explained in Note 1(j)).

(b) Depreciation of Non-Current Assets

All non-current assets having a limited useful life to the Authority are systematically depreciated over their useful lives in a manner that reflects the consumption of their service potential.

Depreciation methods and the estimated useful lives for asset types, which are renewed annually, are set out below:

(c) Employee Entitlements

The Victorian Casino and Gaming Authority (VCGA) has recognised employee entitlements to long-service leave and annual leave in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standard AAS30 "Accounting for Employee Entitlements".

Long Service Leave

The liability for employee entitlements to long service leave represents the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made by the employer resulting from employees' services provided up to balance date.

A current liability is recognised for the amount estimated to be paid within 12 months. Liabilities which are not expected to be settled within 12 months are discounted using government bond rates at balance date, which most closely match the terms of maturity of the related liability.

In determining the liability for long service leave, consideration has been given to future increases in salary and wage rates and the entity's experience with staff departures. Related on-costs have also been included in the liability.

Annual Leave

Provision for accrued annual leave entitlements is made at current salary and wage rates in accordance with relevant awards, agreements and contracts and is inclusive of relevant payroll on-costs.

I. Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

(d) Leases

The Authority has commitments only to operating leases, where the lessor effectively retains substantially all of the risks and benefits incident to ownership of the leased items. Lease payments are charged to expense over the lease term.

(e) Revenue

The Authority's operating revenue comes from its Special Appropriation from the Victorian Government's Consolidated Fund (section 94 of the *Gaming and Betting Act 1994*).

(f) Economic Dependency

The normal operating activities of the Authority and the ability of the Authority to meet its debts as and when they fall due depends on the continued financial support of the State Government of Victoria.

(g) Bad and Doubtful Debts

There are no bad or doubtful debts for the reporting period as the Authority expects to receive all debts owed.

(h) Revaluations of Non-current Assets

A review of asset values by management at 30 June 1999 has resulted in a number of minor asset revaluations to better reflect their carrying amount. The carrying amount of assets does not exceed their recoverable amount. Revaluation increments are credited directly to the Asset Revaluation Reserve (Note 14). This revaluation came into effect as at 30 June 1999.

(i) Appropriations

The Authority's Special Appropriation is recognised as revenue in the period in which the Authority receives the appropriated funds. Undrawn appropriations at the end of the year are not taken up as revenue because the Authority cannot draw on these funds after balance date.

(j) Changes in Accounting Policies

Capitalisation of EDP Software

Software purchases below \$100,000 are immediately written off as an expense where previously these costs were capitalised. The change resulted from a decision by management that better reflects the true service potential of this class of asset to the Authority. The impact on the financial statements has been an increase in Operating Expenses (Assets Written Off) of \$468,942 and a corresponding decrease in the operating surplus for the year.

Proceeds from Sale of Motor Vehicles

In 1998-99 the proceeds from sale of motor vehicles was treated as Administered Revenue whereas previously these funds were treated as revenue of the Authority. The revised treatment was due to a change in Government process which required the proceeds to be paid directly to the Victorian Government. The financial impact of the change resulted in a reduction of the Authority's revenue of \$52,663 in 1998-99, equivalent to the current year proceeds from sale, and a corresponding reduction in the Operating Surplus for the year.



AUDITOR-GENERAL'S REPORT

To the Members of the Parliament of Victoria, the responsible Ministers and the Members of the Board of the Victorian Casino and Gaming Authority.

Audit Scope

The accompanying financial report of the Victorian Casino and Gaming Authority for the financial year ended 30 June 1999, comprising a revenue and expense statement, statement of financial position, statement of cash flows and notes to the financial statements, has been audited. The Members of the Authority's Board are responsible for the preparation and presentation of the financial report and the information it contains. An independent audit of the financial report has been carried out in order to express an opinion on it to the Members of the Parliament of Victoria, the responsible Ministers and the Members of the Authority's Board as required by the *Audit Act 1994*.

The audit has been conducted in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards to provide reasonable assurance as to whether the financial report is free of material misstatement. The audit procedures included an examination, on a test basis, of evidence supporting the amounts and other disclosures in the financial report, and the evaluation of accounting policies and significant accounting estimates. These procedures have been undertaken to form an opinion as to whether, in all material respects, the financial report is presented fairly in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and other mandatory professional reporting requirements and complies with the requirements of the *Financial Management Act 1994*, so as to present a view which is consistent with my understanding of the Authority's financial position, the results of its operations and its cash flows.

A P P E N D I X I B

Commencement Dates of New Legislation

Interactive Gaming (Player Protection) Act 1999 (No. 41/1999)

This Act received Royal Assent on 8 June 1999.

Sections 1 and 2 came into operation on Royal Assent. The remaining provisions will be successively brought into operation by proclamation.

This Act provides for protection of players participating in interactive gaming that is controlled or operated from a computer server located in Victoria.

Licensed providers will be subject to probity assessment, with requirements for the games to be conducted from approved premises and the rules of an interactive game to be approved by the Victorian Casino and Gaming Authority.

Registered players of interactive gaming may lodge complaints with the Authority about Victorian licensed providers.

The Act provides for player protection by giving an opportunity to players to deal with regulated licensed service providers of interactive games in Victoria, as a more secure alternative to dealing with unregulated providers interstate or overseas.

Gaming Acts (Further Amendment) Act 1998 (No. 90/1998)

This Act received Royal Assent on 24 November 1998 and came into operation on this date, except for sections 29, 30, 31 and 32, which came into operation on 1 March 1999 and section 36, which came into operation on 1 June 1999.

Gaming No. 2 Act 1997

- Amendments to this Act strengthened enforcement provisions and ensured consistency with licensing requirements for other areas of gaming.
- In particular -
 - changes which came into operation on 1 March 1999 provided that a bingo operator's licence, which previously could only be issued to an individual, can now be issued to a body corporate (an incorporated applicant), that an applicant for a trade promotion lottery permit need not be a natural person, and that while a natural person may still apply for a permit to conduct a trade promotion lottery, a permit may also be issued to a body corporate (incorporated applicant) with a natural person as nominee; and

A P P E N D I X I B

- changes which came into operation on 1 June 1999 removed the requirement for a separate account for each minor gaming activity (raffles, bingo, lucky envelopes, fundraising nights) and substituted a requirement that a single account be maintained at a financial institution in Victoria for all transactions relating to minor gaming activities held by the organisation.

Casino (Management Agreement) Act 1993

- Amendments to this Act ratified the Fifth Deed of Variation to the Management Agreement for the Melbourne Casino Project.

Club Keno Act 1993

- For the purposes of the Tattersall's corporatisation, this amendment clarified that a person conducting Club Keno games must be an entity wholly owned and controlled by Tattersall's or an entity which is itself wholly owned and controlled by Tattersall's.

Gaming and Betting Act 1994, Casino Control Act 1991

- These amendments clarified that the Victorian Casino and Gaming Authority has the power to waive post-employment restrictions concerning staff.

Gaming Machine Control Act 1991

- For the purposes of the Tattersall's corporatisation, this amendment clarified that a gaming operator under the Act must be an entity wholly owned and controlled by Tattersall's or an entity which is itself wholly owned and controlled by Tattersall's.
- Other amendments to this Act strengthened enforcement and administrative provisions.

Gaming Acts (Miscellaneous Amendments) Act 1997 (No. 90/1997)

This Act received Royal Assent on 9 December 1997.

On 31 August 1998 amendments came into effect which separated the venue operator's licence approval process from the premises approval process. A person can now be licensed independently of a premises approval.

These amendments also allow additional venues to be added to a venue operator's licence, rather than having to lodge separate applications for each additional venue.

The *Casino Control (Junkets And Premium Players) (Interim) Regulations 1998* (SR No 128/1998) were made on 20 October 1998 and operated from 20 October 1998 until 31 March 1999, when they expired.

The *Casino Control (Junkets And Premium Players) Regulations 1999* (SR No 35/1999) were made on and operated from 30 March 1999.

The *Gaming Machine Control (Fees) (Amendment) Regulations 1998* (SR No 108/1998) were made on 25 August 1998 and came into operation on 1 November 1998, being the date when section 7 of the *Gaming Acts (Miscellaneous Amendment) Act 1997* came into operation.

Ministerial Directions

Gaming Machine Control Act 1991

I, Roger M Hallam, MLC, Minister for Gaming, pursuant to section 12 of the *Gaming Machine Control Act 1991*, hereby revoke all previous directions to the Victorian Gaming Commission and the Victorian Casino and Gaming Authority and in substitution therefore, hereby direct the Victorian Casino and Gaming Authority

- (a) that the maximum number of gaming machines permitted in the State to be available for gaming in all venues licensed under the *Gaming Machine Control Act 1991*, other than the Melbourne Casino, is 27,500; and
- (b) that, in respect of the 27,500 gaming machines permitted to be available for gaming in all licensed venues, other than the Melbourne Casino, the proportion of gaming machines to be located outside the Melbourne Statistical Division is not less than 20%; and
- (c) that, in respect of the 27,500 gaming machines permitted to be available for gaming in all licensed venues, other than the Melbourne Casino, the maximum permissible number of gaming machines to be placed -
 - (i) in restricted areas in the State is 100 with no bet limit applying; and
 - (ii) in unrestricted areas in the State is five with a bet limit of \$2.00 to apply; and
- (d) that, in respect of the 27,500 gaming machines permitted to be available for gaming in all licensed venues, other than the Melbourne Casino, the proportion to be placed in premises, in respect of which -
 - (i) a residential licence under section 46 of the *Liquor Control Act 1987* or a general licence under section 47 of the Act is in force, is 50%; and
 - (ii) a club licence under section 48 of the *Liquor Control Act 1987* or a licence under Part I, II or III of the *Racing Act 1958* is in force, is 50%; and
- (e) that, in respect of the 27,500 gaming machines that are permitted to be available for gaming in all licensed venues, other than the Melbourne Casino, the proportion of gaming machines which each gaming operator is permitted to operate is 50%.

Rules of the Victorian Casino and Gaming Authority

Gaming Machine Control Act 1991

VICTORIAN CASINO AND GAMING AUTHORITY RULES 1997

Pursuant to section 78 of the *Gaming Machine Control Act 1991* ("the Act"), the Victorian Casino and Gaming Authority makes the following Rules:

PART 1 - PRELIMINARY

Title

1. These Rules may be cited as the Victorian Casino and Gaming Authority Rules 1997.

Application

2. These Rules are in addition to the requirements of the Act and of a venue operator's licence, including licence conditions.

PART 2 - CONDUCT OF GAMING

Hours of operation

3. Gaming machines at an approved venue may be played only-
 - (a) during the period that gaming patrons are permitted unfettered access to the gaming area subject to any reasonable standards of dress and behaviour that may be imposed by the venue; and
 - (b) (i) during any period when sale and disposal of liquor for consumption on the premises is authorised under the *Liquor Control Act 1987*; or
 - (ii) during any period when liquor so sold and disposed of is authorised under section 55 of that Act to be consumed on the premises.

A P P E N D I X 3

Supervision of gaming machine areas generally

4. A venue operator must ensure that the operation of the licensed gaming area and each gaming machine is subject to continual supervision. Supervision may be electronic or physical or a combination of both.

Competitions ancillary or incidental to the conduct of gaming (EGM tournaments)

5. (1) A venue operator must advise the Authority in writing, at least one week prior to the conduct of any competition, of the date, time, location, projected number of players, amount of the prize pool and the amount of and source of any funds in the prize pool.
- (2) A venue operator must not promote any competition that is ancillary or incidental to the conduct of gaming at the venue unless the competition complies with this rule.
- (3) Any competition under this rule must:
 - (a) provide all players with an equal opportunity of winning each prize determined solely by the operation of the gaming machines; and
 - (b) provide for all players to contribute equally to the prize pool; and
 - (c) distribute all contributions into the prize pool from participants in the competition and any other party (or advertised to be contributed by any other party); and
 - (d) provide for each player to collect that person's gaming machine credit balance at the conclusion of each session of competition play.
- (4) The collection and distribution of the prize pool for any competition does not form part of any calculation under sections 135 or 136 of the *Gaming Machine Control Act 1991*.
- (5) Each participant prior to the commencement of any competition must be informed about the amount of their funds to be used to establish gaming machine credits, the amount of their contribution to the prize pool and the rules for determining the distribution of the prize pool.
- (6) Any entry fee must be collected by the venue operator prior to commencement of the competition.

A P P E N D I X 3

PART 3 - GAMING MACHINE AREAS

Location of gaming machines generally

6. A gaming machine area in an approved venue must be wholly located within a building and within an area where liquor is dispensed for consumption on the premises.

Special requirements for restricted areas

7. (1) A restricted area in an approved venue must be clearly identifiable.
- (2) It must not be necessary for a patron of an approved venue to pass through a restricted area in order only to enter or leave the venue or to gain access to another part of the venue.

Minors

8. There must be adequate signage which advises that persons under the age of 18 years must not enter or remain in the restricted area.

Provision of cash for the purposes of gaming

9. (1) Automatic teller machines (ATM) and electronic funds transfer (EFTPOS) devices must not be accessible by any person within the restricted area of an approved venue for the purposes of withdrawing cash.
- (2) Cash must not be provided to a patron through a credit card or charge card transaction for the purposes of gaming.

Display of venue operator's licence

10. A copy of the venue operator's licence or Notice of Approved Venue must be displayed in a prominent place at the approved venue.

Rules effective from 2 April 1997 except Rule 10 which is effective from 27 August 1998

Under section 144 of the *Casino Control Act 1991*, the Authority delegated to the Director of Gaming and Betting its functions under-

- section 28A(1) of that Act, by instrument dated 28 July 1998, (to investigate and determine the suitability of associates of a casino operator);
- section 30(1)(b) of that Act, by instrument dated 27 October 1998, (to investigate controlled contracts of a casino operator).

Under section 107A of the *Gaming Machine Control Act 1991*, on 25 February 1999, the Authority delegated to the Chairman its functions under section 142A(5) (to issue a notice directing a gaming operator, a venue operator or a manufacturer or supplier listed on any Roll to terminate an association).

Under section 107A of the *Gaming Machine Control Act 1991* on 11 February 1999, the Authority delegated to three members its functions under sections 12B(5), 12C(2), 12D, 12E, 12F, 12H, 12K, 20(3), 21, 22, 23, 25, 25A and 30 of that Act.

Under section 107A of the *Gaming Machine Control Act 1991*, on 28 July 1998, the Authority delegated to the Director of Gaming and Betting its functions under section 142A(1) (to investigate any associates of a gaming operator, a venue operator or a manufacturer or supplier listed on any Roll).

Under section 107A of the *Gaming Machine Control Act 1991*, on 25 February 1999, the Authority delegated to the Director of Gaming and Betting and Assistant Director, Gambling Operations, Audit and Finance its functions under section 71 (to approve the installation of a linked jackpot arrangement).

Under section 103 of the *Gaming No. 2 Act 1997*, on 25 February 1999, the Authority delegated to the Chairman its functions under section 34(2) of the Act (to approve the form of an application for a bingo centre operator's licence) and on 25 February 1999 delegated to each member of the Authority its functions under section 45 of that Act (to grant a provisional operator's licence to a person in respect of a bingo centre).

A P P E N D I X 4

Under section 103 of the *Gaming No. 2 Act 1997*, on 23 December 1998, the Authority delegated the following powers to the Director of Gaming and Betting:

- under sections 4, the power to declare an organisation to be a community or charitable organisation;
- under section 34(3), the power to request an applicant for a bingo centre operator's licence to provide additional information;
- under section 37, to investigate an application for a bingo centre operator's licence;
- under section 38, to require further information from an applicant or an associate of an applicant for a bingo centre operator's licence; and
- under section 48(2), to investigate the associates of a bingo centre operator.

Under section 92A of the *Gaming and Betting Act 1994*, the Authority, on 25 February 1999, delegated to the Assistant Director, Gambling Operations, Audit and Finance its functions under section 70(2) to approve totalisator equipment.

A P P E N D I X 5

Research Charter

The *Gaming Machine Control Act 1991*, section 109(e), requires the Authority to fund research into, and advise the Minister for Gaming on, the social impact of gaming.

The Authority will achieve this objective by adopting and operating within a broad set of principles (as detailed below).

These principles establish and describe parameters for the purpose of implementation of functional roles and responsibilities.

1. The fundamental purpose of research conducted by the Authority is to gather data in a format that will enable it to:
 - make available to the public reliable information on the social impact of gambling;
 - put its views to the Government on policy issues in a timely manner; and
 - carry out regulatory functions and recommend implementation of changes to those functions as appropriate.
2. The Authority will undertake and/or commission such research as is necessary to ensure that the social impact of gaming is thoroughly documented and understood for the benefit of the community, the Government and the industry.
3. Co-operation and co-ordination of the research effort among and between the industry and community will be encouraged, to facilitate the rationalisation and standardisation of research into the social impact of gambling and to achieve reciprocal benefit and cost savings.
4. To assess social impact as required under the Act, social impact will be defined for this purpose as:
 - impact on individuals and families;
 - impact on communities and neighbourhoods;
 - cultural and social impact; and
 - socio-economic impact.
5. The Authority will monitor significant research developments both within Victoria and on the interstate and international levels as part of on going efforts to maintain Victoria at the forefront of gambling studies and research.
6. The Authority will establish and maintain basic data sets such as are necessary to enable it to perform its research and other functions.
7. From time to time, specific issues of concern within the community will arise that the Authority will research, report on and provide its views on policy matters to the Minister.
8. The Authority will identify and implement necessary longitudinal and consequential impact studies.
9. The Authority will disseminate results of its research wherever possible (taking into account commercial sensitivities) to government, commercial operators, other researchers, interest groups, media and the general public.

GLOSSARY

Authority	Victorian Casino and Gaming Authority
Casino Agreement	The casino agreement (as amended) dated 21 September 1993, is one of the documents governing the relationship between Crown Limited and the Authority.
Controlled contract	A requirement in the <i>Casino Control Act 1991</i> , that all contracts for the supply of goods and services to casinos be approved by, or reported to the Authority.
Director of Gaming and Betting	The Director of Gaming and Betting is appointed by the Governor in Council under the <i>Gaming and Betting Act 1994</i> .
Director of Casino Surveillance	The Director of Casino Surveillance is appointed by the Governor in Council under the <i>Casino Control Act 1991</i> .
Exclusion order	The casino operator or the Director of Casino Surveillance can issue a notice to a person excluding that person from entering a casino, either because the person has misbehaved in the casino or because the person has asked to be excluded. There is a right of appeal to a committee of the Authority against an exclusion order.
Gaming licence	Gaming licences are held by TABCORP and Tattersall's. The licences authorise the ownership and operation of electronic gaming machines in licensed venues.
Gross gaming revenue	The gross gaming revenue is the total amount received for gaming at the casino, less the amount of prizes paid out as winnings.
Internal Control Manual	The Internal Control Manual is a set of documents approved by the Authority detailing the casino operator's system of controls and procedures to be implemented in the casino.
Junket operator	A junket operator is a person who is approved to bring groups of patrons (a junket) to a casino and who receives a commission based on the level of gaming play of those patrons.
Junket representative	A junket representative is a person who works for a junket operator.
Longitudinal study	A study conducted over a number of years.

Lucky envelope	A lucky envelope is a lottery ticket, where the result is pre-determined. The ticket must be made so that the result cannot be seen until after it is sold.
Melbourne Casino	The casino at Southbank which opened on 8 May 1997.
Raffle	A raffle is a lottery where no money prize is offered. Raffles in Victoria may only be conducted by community or charitable organisations under permit from the Authority, unless the prize value is \$5,000 or less, when no permit is required but prescribed conditions apply.
Special employee	A special employee is the holder of a licence under the <i>Gaming Machine Control Act 1991</i> who is employed at an approved venue or for a gaming operator carrying out duties prescribed in the <i>Gaming Machine Control Act (Special Employees and Technicians) Regulations 1992</i> .
Trade promotion lottery	A trade promotion lottery is a competition or other game run by a manufacturer or seller of a product or service to promote their business.
Venue operator	A venue operator is a person (whether natural or corporate) who is a holder of a licence under the <i>Gaming Machine Control Act 1991</i> . A venue operator's licence allows the holder to possess electronic gaming machines obtained from a gaming operator at approved premises.
